Futurescape - Paper Perth, **The Nook, Ground Floor**

Graham "Polly" Farmer Showcase, **State Library Level 3**

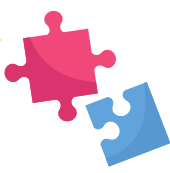

Author in Focus: Dr Seuss



We all know his books but how much do you know about the elusive 'Dr Seuss'?

Born Theodor Seuss Geisel on March 2, 1904, he began using Suess (his mother's maiden name which is actually pronounced "Zoice", like 'voice') as his pen name when writing for his college magazine. He has also used the pseudonym Theo LeSieg, which is 'Geisel' spelled backwards.

In 1957, 'Cat in the Hat' was written following a challenge by his boss at Houghton Mifflin, for Dr Seuss to write a story that first graders 'can't put down' using only 348 words from a vocabulary list for 6-7 year olds. He did it using only 236 and based the book on the first two rhyming words on the list...cat and hat!

Three years later, his publisher, Bennett Cerf, bet him \$50 that he could not write a book using fifty or fewer different words. The words being: a, am, and, anywhere, are, be, boat, box, car, could, dark, do, eat, eggs, fox, goat, good, green, ham, here, house, I, if, in, let, like, may, me, mouse, not, on, or, rain, Sam, say, see, so, thank, that, the, them, there, they, train, tree, try, will, with, would, you. The challenge was taken and the result was "Green Eggs and Ham" which, having the fewest words of all his books, became his most popular, and one of the best-selling children's books of all time.

Dr Seuss was also a successful illustrator, artist and sculpture. He died on Sept 24, 1991 but left a legacy of genius and imagination that continues to inspire kids and adults around the world.
